HEADQUARTERS, SCOTTISH BOMBARDMENT GROUP (A), UNITS HISTORY....

Administrative changes for the month were as follows:
1st Lt. Joseph S. Riorda assigned and joined as of 2 Sept and assigned as Group Vice Officer; Chaplain (Capt.) Cameron to temporary duty at Belmont Abbey, Berksford, from 4 to 9 Sept; 2nd Lt. Ronald J. Medden on DS with the 1st Pathfinder Sq., relieved from assignment and assigned to 20th Station complement Squadron as of 5 Sept; the entry in the August installment of Group history pertaining to Capt. Leander being transferred to IX Bomber Command as of 30 August was in error. The morning report was corrected and the date of transfer is as of 7 Sept 44; Capt. Carreras granted a 4-day leave effective 9 Sept and on leave he was married in Scotland with Capt. McDevitt, of this group acting as best man; Capt. Haile detailed to duty as Group Intelligence Officer as of 11 Sept; Capt. Donnell granted 5-day leave as of 12 Sept; Lt. Mullins received a 7-day leave 11 Sept; Capt. Lyons departed on TD to Scotland as of 14 Sept and returned 17 Sept; Major Saar was given 7-days leave as of 16 Sept; Lt. Col. Lankey placed on TD to Zone of Interior as of 16 Sept; 1st Lt. Lyons assigned to the 307 Sta. Hosp, C.R.C., AFM 514-A as of 18 Sept and on the same date Major Hill was relieved and assigned to the 3th AF RD, Sta. 594. Also on the same date Capt. William F. Kash, Jr., joined from the 306 Bomb Sq. On 19 Sept., Lt. Col. Jewell C. Maxwell joined from the 344th Bomb Gp and was detailed Group Air Executive during the absence of Lt. Col. Lankey; 1st Lt. Strand was relieved and assigned to the 552nd B Sq as of 18 Sept; 1st Lt. Mullins was relieved and assigned to the 304th Bomb Sq as of 20 Sept; Col. Kelly who was on TD in the Zone of the Interior was relieved from assignment and assigned to the IX Bomber Command as of 17 Sept. On 7 Sept, Capt. Anderson was relieved and assigned to the 21st Weather Squadron and Capt. Miller was relieved from assignment and assigned to the 1st RCD as of 27 Sept; Capt. William A. Smith joined from the 500th Bomb Sq and was detailed as Group Bombardier Officer (Principal duty.)

Promotions:

Capt. Reife, group adjutant, promoted to major as of 1 Sept; Lt. McDevitt, group statistic officer, promoted to Capt effective 1 Sept; 1st Lt. Penzur was promoted to Capt.(X) as of 7 Sept.

3. HEADQUARTERS, 366TH BOMBARDMENT GROUP (H), AND AIRPORT....

Preparations for overseas movement:

The usual preparations were carried out at the beginning of the month with the group receiving departure alert order as of 1 Sept.

On 19 Sept, Major Levin and Major Rubenstein (attached) with seven enlisted men departed on temporary duty to the Far Shore by motor convoy as part of the reconnaissance section.

On 24 Sept, a convoy of trucks belonging to the 26-8 & Truck Co., AV., departed for the Far Shore carrying files and material of this group. In this convoy were the classified operational material of B-5 except for a skeleton operating supply, and 1st Lt. D. L. Leibman and two enlisted men of one 366th Bomb Sq. Intelligence Section were detailed to accompany the truck as carrier and guards for this classified material.

On 25 Sept, Capt Lippens and 11 enlisted men left on temporary duty to the Far Shore as the Advanced Section. Capt Lippens and 7 A's went by air and the other 4 A's traveled by motor convoy.

On 27 Sept, Major Dougherty, Capt Miller (Ord) and Chaplain (Capt) Rogers with seven enlisted men left for the Far Shore by air.

36 aircraft bombed road bridge at Brest with fair to excellent results. All returned safely.

36 aircraft bombed target at Brest with fair to good results. All returned safely.

6 Sept

36 aircraft bombed target at Brest with excellent results. All returned safely.

Eight aircraft dropped leaflets on Brest, Calais and Ghent. All returned safely.

10 Sept

Thirty-six aircraft bombed target at Ruyet ou Baye with good to excellent results. All returned safely.

14 aircraft (A-26's) bombed railroad bridge at Cus-tine with excellent results. All returned safely.

11 Sept 1944

36 aircraft bombed target at Metz with good to excellent results. All returned safely.

14 A-26's bombed target at Metz with good results. All returned safely.

12 A-26's bombed target at Leeuwarden with fair to excellent results. All returned safely.

12 Sept 1944

36 aircraft bombed fortifications at Schield with good to excellent results. All returned safely.

11 aircraft (A-26's) bombed fortifications at Schield with good to excellent results. All returned safely.

14 Sept 1944

36 aircraft bombed target at Brest with good results. All aircraft returned safely.

12 A-26's bombed target at Brest with good to excellent results. All returned safely.

16 Sept 1944

12 aircraft (A-26's) bombed Bergen Opzoom with good results. All returned safely.

19 Sept 1944

15 A-20's bombed target at Duren with excellent results.
All returned safely.

36 aircraft bombed target at Duren with excellent results. 1 aircraft crash-landed at Great Salting with personnel uninjured. Other aircraft returned safely.

23 Sept 1944

36 aircraft took off to bomb target at Venlo, but did not drop bombs. Two aircraft crash-landed on strip on Far Shore with 1 crew member killed in landing. Both aircraft were from the 504th Squadron. Other aircraft returned safely.
