


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I. ORGANIZATION:

V. AWARDS AND DECORATIONS:

Eighteen members of the Organization received air Medals. Two received Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters.

VI. MISSIONS:

All of the targets for the month were of a tactical nature and concentrated on stopping the flow of material to the enemy and in close co-ordination with Ground forces in driving the retreating elements of the German Army in the Bulge Area.

Stienbruck Railroad Bridge was destroyed, cuttling off rail transportation. Targets at Clervaux, Wayen - communication centers, direct hits were scored on highways and mershalling yards with excellent results. A road junction at Gerolstein was bombed with good results, under adverse conditions - and again at Stautkyll and Haleschieb, both road junctions, were destroyed, steadily closing all avenue of escape before the retreating Germans.

The Squadron can well be proud of its part in stopping the forward movement of the Germans in the Bulge Area and trapping and destroying him in retreat.

VII. STATION LIFE:

The month of January was one of the hardest for our Squadron, with plenty of snow and ice - the shortage of fuel made life miserable. But the hardships were all laughed at, in good spirit.

Movies were shown weekly in our Mess-Hall, and our nightly passes continued. Day passes into Paris were still in order together with 48 hour passes, also to Paris.

In a near-by town of fair size, a notel was rented to alleviate the Crowded conditions in Paris, and 48 hour passes were also given, this was at no expense to the personnel - government rations were served.

The Officers had their weekly Dance and Party at their Club and the Enlisted Men held a Champagne Party in theirs'. We are still hearing of the details.

Each night the War News is broadcasted to the Squadron over our P.A. system. A service of the Intelligence Section. Opl Marshall is to be complimented for his work. A daily Situation Map was kept posted for

all interested. Close-order drill is carried on for one hour each week, just for the knack of keeping in condition.

Red Alerts were nearly the order of the day, but we were visited only once by night intruders, but no damage was done.

The combat team of Captain James K. Dozier, Pilot 1st Lt Elmer C. Hessdocfor, B/N S/Sgts Wilbur C. Borecky and Theodore G. Muller, had the pleasure to visit the front and Captain Thomas E. Pickering of our Intelligence Section made the fourth of another combat team, to visit the front.

Captain Fickering on arriving back gave two lectures, to all personnel and brought home visual pictures of the jobs the Air Forces were playing and the close co-ordination we were giving the ground forces.

VIII. SPECIAL INTEREST:

On a moments notice and out of the blue, came orders for Corporal Flevous J. Van Dyke, 3450,642, to be ready for a trip back home, Van was hurriedly bundled off loaded down with addresses and telephone numbers of friends and relatives of the men in the Squadron to call and
